## Pillars of Catholic Penitential Practice: Fasting

Prayer, fasting and almsgiving: these acts of penance come to us from Christ himself (Matt. 6:1-8, 16-18). There is no Christian life without repentance, and there is no repentance that is not realized in the concrete action of abstinence, generous giving, and prayer. Jesus teaches us that by these hidden disciplines we enter into intimacy with his Father in Heaven who “sees in secret” (Matt. 6:4, 18). The three “pillars” stand together—contracting the boundaries of our consumption, expanding the boundaries of our generosity, and enlarging our capacity to pray. I start this three-part reflection with fasting.

Jesus simply assumes that his followers will fast (Matt. 6:1). And he himself, during his trial in the wilderness, prepared for his ministry and his coming sacrifice with a time of severe fasting.

*Friday, Still the Universal Day of Penance . . .*

For the Catholic Christian, every Friday partakes of the mystery of Good Friday. Through the whole of the year, we prepare for the coming Sunday by acts of penance on Friday. As you know, the mandate was once very simple. A Catholic who ate meat on Fridays did so on pain of sin. Now, as became effective on November 27, 1966, the mandate is changed. The bishops *did not alter the penitential character of Friday*. All Catholics age 14 years and older are to engage in penitential actions on Friday, through some form of fasting and acts of mercy. What changed is that the bishops no longer specified abstinence from meat. They now rely on you and me to choose a meaningful Friday abstinence. Why the change? We will come back to that below.

*The Lenten Observance . . . .*

The Friday mandate has changed, *except for every Friday in Lent*. All are to abstain from meat on all Fridays of Lent. Two days of the year—Ash Wednesday and Good Friday—are days of abstinence *and* fasting. On these two days, we are not only to abstain from eating meat, but to eat only one meal (or two very light meals). Once again, the abstinence rule holds for all those 14 years and older. There are, however, exceptions. Pregnant and nursing mothers, those who are ill, and all those over 60 years old are not required to fast.

*Simple Rules or Love's Disciplines?*

Why have the rules changed from time to time, most recently in 1966? If you read the Pastoral Statements of the bishops (the 1983 statements of the U.S. bishops is especially useful), there is no doubt about the bishop's hopes and intentions. They desired, not a relaxing of penitential practice, but an *intensification* of penitential *devotion*. It's easy enough to understand what the bishop's were worried about. They desired, not rule-keeping, but conversion of heart. They worried about the minimalism that always attends the rule-keeping mentality—like the “observance” of abstinence from meat by enjoying, for example, large portions of white clam sauce over pasta with ice cream for desert! Our bishops hoped for that spirit articulated so elegantly by Blessed John Henry Newman. “Let not the year go round and round, without a break and interruption in its circle of pleasures. Give back some of God's gifts to God, that you may safely enjoy the rest . . . . Did the bishops fail? Were they simply naïve? That, of course, will depend on us.

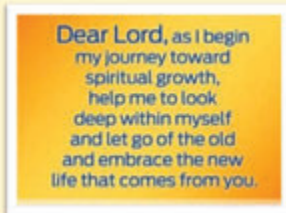
**For Our Children**

**Why do Catholics Abstain from Meat on Fridays in Lent?** *Adapted from a blog by Mark Hart*  
 You're in a hurry. Your mind is on a test next period and you run through the lunch line a get a hamburger. Halfway through lunch – you remember it's Friday. And it's Lent! OOPS! Is this a sin? If you have forgotten, it is not a sin. So why exactly do Catholics abstain from eating meat on Fridays during Lent? There are many stories of why the church embraces this discipline, a tradition that dates back hundreds of years. Some say it was because the church was trying to support the fishing industry, Some say that not eating meat helped folks to focus on the humility of Christ, who lived a simple man's life. I prefer to look at it like this: Jesus Christ, my Lord and my Savior, gave up His own body, *His own flesh*, that Friday so many years ago, for me and for you. He went through the pain of that self-sacrifice, completely mindful of God the Father.

**When I go through the incredibly minor act of abstaining from meat on Fridays, it is just one tiny act of self-sacrifice that points me back to that awful but Good Friday.**

That was the Friday when God loved me so much that He gave up His flesh in the most selfless act in history.

**Abstinence is a form of prayer, a discipline.** When we abstain from meat, we focus on Christ and on our souls, rather than on self and on our bodies. It is faith in action, placing our attention on Jesus and offering Him 'our flesh' as a sacrifice (Romans 12:1-2), a vessel through which He can and does work.

## 1ST SUNDAY OF LENT FEBRUARY 18, 2018

### Small Christian Community Faith Sharing

Please note that we put the following week's Gospel passage in this space so you can prepare all week for Proclamation of the Gospel the following Sunday. Faith Sharing helps ordinary people connect their faith with everyday life experiences.

#### Excerpt from the Gospel for the Second Sunday of Lent, February 25, 2018 - Mark 9:2-10

Jesus took Peter, James, and John and led them up a high mountain apart by themselves. And he was transfigured before them... Then Elijah appeared to them along with Moses, and they were conversing with Jesus... Then a cloud came, casting a shadow over them; from the cloud came a voice, 'This is my beloved Son. Listen to him.' As they were coming down from the mountain, Jesus charged them not to relate what they had seen to anyone, except when the Son of Man had risen from the dead. So they kept the matter to themselves, questioning what rising from the dead meant."

#### Commentary:

Throughout Mark's Gospel, we hear the question "Who is Jesus?" In the Transfiguration, we hear the clearest answer. But this foreshadowing of the Resurrection comes between two predictions of suffering and rejection. Even Jesus' closest apostles fail to understand what Jesus means by "rising from the dead," and they do not want to hear his predictions of his Passion. But Mark makes it clear to his audience that resurrection can only be understood in the mystery of suffering and dying.

#### Questions for Reflection and Sharing:

1. What is God saying to me in this Gospel passage?
2. What word or phrase in this Gospel speaks to me?
3. What word or phrase in the Reflection resonates with me?

### LENTEN REGULATIONS 2018

**Abstinence from meat:** All Catholics who have reached their 14th birthday are bound to abstain totally from meat on the following days: Ash Wednesday, all Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday.

**Fasting:** All Catholics between the ages of 19 and 59 are bound also to observe the Law of Fast on the following days: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Fasting, that is eating less, involves limiting oneself to a full meal and avoiding food between meals. Lighter nourishment may be taken on two other occasions in the course of the day.

**Prayer & Penance:** The entire season of Lent should be observed in a spirit of prayer and penance. Spending extra time in prayer (such as the Rosary or Stations of the Cross) or Bible study, attending daily Mass or Eucharistic Adoration, voluntary sacrifice and self-denial, combined with works of charity and service to others, are all excellent ways to obey the Lord's command to reform our lives and to prepare for the joyful celebration of Easter.

**Easter Duty:** All Catholics who have reached the age of reason must confess their serious sins in the Sacrament of Penance at least once a year. They must also receive Holy Communion at least once during the Easter season, which this year extends from March 5th, the first Sunday of Lent, until Trinity Sunday, May 27th..
