## **Letter from Angel Tree Parent**

Dear Christine,

I am in receipt of your letter dated January 11 regarding your Church's participation in the Angel Tree program in donating a gift to my daughter this past Christmas. I wish to express my gratitude to everyone at The Church of St. Thomas More who helped

make this possible. This was my first Christmas away from home, and I wanted my daughter to know that I love her and that I haven't forgotten about her. It meant a lot to me that through the generosity of the parishioners at St. Thomas More, I was able to show her that love, joy and hope we all want to feel at Christmas through the surprise visit and presentation of the Angel Tree card and gift to her.

I was very moved by your kind letter and photograph of her receiving her gift. I think of the time and energy that went into making that moment possible and I am truly grateful that despite my current status as a Federal prisoner, there are those who care enough about families like ours to make this act of charity. This difficult time has brought our family closer together and has shown us how much Christ loves us through the love we have for each other, and our fellow Christians.

I think of other families who are less fortunate than I am, and I want to "pay in forward" for families who have less, so another separated family may feel the love and Joy of Christ the way ours did this year.
